Main themes :	<p>The course deals with the following key issues:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- the concept of organisation and its development in organisational sociology (organisational structures, contingency, environmental influence, systems of authority and power etc)</li> <li>- Communication theories and their links to organisations (transmissive and systemic approaches, images and representations etc);</li> <li>- Notions of " operational ", " integrative " and " self-organising " communication, notions of internal and external communication;</li> <li>- The organisation as a system of culturally regulated behaviour (notions of business culture and " corporate culture ");</li> <li>- Policies and strategies of organisational communication ("business communication", public relations, advertising, business press etc) as modes of intervention and legitimacy.</li> </ul>
