Content :	<p>The introduction outlines a number of basic premises relating to the originality of psycho-analysis.</p> <p>The first part examines the various ways in which psycho-analysis has been linked to the field of criminology by means of contextualization and discussion of texts by authors ranging from Freud to Lacan.</p> <p>The second part examines recent theoretical and practical developments during the second half of the 20th century.</p> <p>The final part will look at how psycho-analysis can throw new light on contemporary feelings of malaise and the emergence of new forms of crime.</p>
