Main themes :	Emphasis will be given on the different aspects of contemporary Japanese society: heritage of the past, economic structures and policies, political system, culture (traditional architecture, handicrafts, literature), sociological and educational characteristics.

Evaluation methods :	Class participation; oral presentation; individual written assignment or participation in a group project.
Teaching methods :	Active learning - lectures, group discussions and student presentations. Students are expected to complete assigned readings before each lecture and attend classes regularly.
Content :	Part One: Social foundations - religion and culture; education; work and labour; crime and punishment; Part Two: "Class, identity and status" social class and social identity; gender stratification and the family system; minorities and discrimination; aging, population decline and social welfare; Part Three: Politics: political parties and institutions; economic structures and policies; main external relations; regional diplomacy in East Asia; evolving global role; Part Four: Popular culture and entertainment.
