Main themes :	<p>Using the material learned in the course "Fondements 1," the course aims to make the student more familiar with two or three of the crucial research problems issuing from each period and touching different areas of research. In this manner, the course leads the student to a deeper understanding of Western society from Antiquity to the present time. The lecturer will not address the two "inter-period" themes that formed the basis of the "Fondements 1" course in the first semester. The topics developed during the four series will be discussed and agreed upon by the lecturers.</p> <p>Method:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Four series of "directed readings," each bearing on one of the four periods of history: Antiquity, Middle Ages, the Modern Era, and the Contemporary Period</li> <li>- Preparation and deepening of one's knowledge of the subject matter through these readings.</li> </ul>
Aims :	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- For each of the four periods, to master the chronology of the history of Western civilization and the main foundations of Western history.</li> <li>- By examining some sources, to master how historical knowledge is developed.</li> <li>- For each of the periods studied, to be able, starting from a "reading folder," to elucidate some of the major problems of historical research.</li> </ul> <p><i>The contribution of this Teaching Unit to the development and command of the skills and learning outcomes of the programme(s) can be accessed at the end of this sheet, in the section entitled "Programmes/courses offering this Teaching Unit".</i></p>
Evaluation methods :	Written examination related to the course and the reading folder.
Teaching methods :	<p>The course will be based on the reading folder, which will provide students with documentation on the developed issues of historical research within the course. These readings will be used as a reference for the teacher and will be a full-fledged part of the student's individual work.</p> <p>A folder with sources that will be commented during the course will also be used as a reference.</p>
Content :	<p>Based on the knowledge gained from the course "Historical Foundations of Western Civilisation I", the course will contemplate three thematics that are related to various (political, economic, social and cultural) fields of History and selected for the understanding of contemporary Western society they provide. The first thematic will be devoted to the phenomenon of religious reformations in the 16th century and to their political and societal impact. The second developed thematic will address the Habsburg's Empire and European hegemonic temptations between the 16th and the 18th centuries. The third thematic will deal with the rebellions and revolutions that stirred Europe and the American colonies in the 17th and 18th centuries.</p>
