| Main themes :                | <p>Alternately with LGLOR 2761, this course begins the linguistic and philological study of Old Slav, by examining:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The place of Slavic in the Indo-European family;</li> <li>2. The place of Old Slavonic in the Slavic family;</li> <li>3. Cyrillic script, phonetics, phonological alternations and morphology;</li> <li>4. The syntax structures studied while reading texts.</li> </ol> <p>This course is taught to students of two different levels, but with one part in common.</p> <p>In the first term (15 hours), it offers a grammatical initiation to beginners, while those who have already started, deepen their knowledge by translating and commenting on texts.</p> <p>In the second term (15 hours), all the students continue with the reading of Old Slavonic texts and the study of special grammar questions.</p> |
| Aims :                       | <p>An introduction to the language and to Old Slavonic texts.</p> <p>At the end of this course, the student will be capable of reading and interpreting for himself texts of medium difficulty. | Content :                    | <p>Near to proto-Slavic (common Slavic), Old Slavonic is attested by liturgical texts translated from Greek, dating from the Xth and XIth centuries.</p> <p>The lectures examine the different chapters of the descriptive grammar and offer an insight into the historical grammar. The course is completed by the reading of texts coming principally from the Gospels.</p>   |
