Prerequisites :	Baccalaureate in ROM or ROGE, with a minor subject in Italian or equivalent.
Main themes :	Depending on the annual program, in this course we study some of the main authors of Italian literature (from the Middle Ages to the XX century). Students are taught to reflect on the genesis of three literary works (one in verse, one in prose, and a play for the theatre) through study of a body of texts and drafts. This allows students to understand the mechanisms and the challenges of writing (on the part of the author), of reading, of interpreting and of editing (in terms of scholarly critique) which all intervene in the production and the reception of literary work.
Aims :	By the end of the course, students are expected to be able to: a) read, analyze and interpret a literary text using the methodologies described and adopted in the course, b) place a literary text within its cultural, linguistic, aesthetic, literary, and scriptural context, c) identify and interpret different textual levels and their interactions. Evaluation methods :	Assignments during the course and oral examination during the examination period.
Teaching methods :	Lectures with student presentations
Content :	Decameron's last novella, whose heroine is the peasant girl Griselda, was an astonishing success over various centuries. Petrarch translated it into Latin. His version, in its turn, was retranslated into Italian. Soon afterwards, this novella was to become known all over Europe: translations and adaptations for theatre, opera and cinema, in German, French, English and Italian have followed one another, up to the present.
