Main themes :	<p>The course will be based on research questions demonstrating the complexity of the interrelationships between demographic, economic and social phenomena. Among these research questions :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Reflexion on the relationships between social and economic development and population growth. - The role of migration as a strategy for food security in the context of deteriorating living conditions. - The influence of demographic conditions in industrialized countries on the implementation of economic policies in the 1980s. - Can a link be established between population growth and changes in social and political structures ? - Does the demographic North-South gap amplifies the economic gap or is it influenced by it ? - Is economic growth facilitated by the size of population ? - Is denatality in western countries a direct consequence of the current pension systems ? - Are migrations a response to differences in population and economic structures ?
