Evaluation methods :	Oral and individual examination.
Teaching methods :	Ex cathedra and field trips (Ename-Oudenaarde, Villers-la-Ville, Raversijde, etc.)
Content :	The lectures are an introduction to the medieval archaeology and the architecture archaeological study in the ancient Low Countries. Archaeological sources are introduced following their chronology and location (geography and rural or urban environment) and illustrate everyday life, consumption and production based on material culture. Links with written sources, iconography and other sciences lead to a socio-economic and technological understanding of the medieval societies.
