Main themes	<p>The historical configurations of the theory of Western architecture, such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • the classical theory of the Orders • the theories of the modern movement and the avant-garde before the First World War and between the two World Wars • criticism of the Modern Movement after 1945 • the emergence of the Post-Modern movement • the contemporary situation (+/- 5 last years). <p>Second introduction to the Vitruvian trinomial which then gave way to Alberti's theories as a basis of a Western approach (re-foundation).</p>
