Main themes	<p>The course is intended as an introduction to the study of texts and doctrines of contemporary philosophy (20th and 21st centuries).</p> <p>It identifies the main aspects of the history of contemporary philosophy of the 20th and 21st centuries, its key trends and prominent thinkers, and will develop students' critical reading of the great works of contemporary philosophy.</p> <p>The following movements will be studied: phenomenology, neo-positivism, critical theory, existentialism, structuralism, hermeneutics, post-modernism, neo-pragmatism.</p>
