The students will of course be notified of these possible changes in due course.</u></b></p> <p>This course will be taught on site in groups of c.25 students (+ e-learning component).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Training learners to become autonomous readers of authentic written documents</li> <li>• Broadening the students' vocabulary scope</li> <li>• Teaching key grammar points such as tenses, auxiliaries, connectives and the passive voice.</li> <li>• Listening decoding strategies in a foreign language</li> <li>• Role plays, debates, discussions</li> <li>• English pronunciation and stress patterns.</li> </ul> <p>As regards speaking skills, the emphasis will be on fluency rather than accuracy.</p>
Content	<p>Portfolio of texts and videos: the set texts range from historic/al sources to today's specialized literature and vary in language registers to include prose, speeches, poetry, songs, video scripts, ... from several target-language countries.</p>
