Place of the course	Louvain-la-Neuve
Main themes	This course is designed to provide students with a historical view of the main trends in philosophy (falsafa) as it developed in the Arabo-Islamic cultural world. It will define what falsafa is, what its origins are and what position it occupies in Arabo-Islamic culture. It provides an introduction to the most significant thinkers, as well as to the issues which have been the subject of debates by the falâsifa.
Learning outcomes	<p>At the end of this learning unit, the student is able to :</p> <p>By the end of the course, students should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • understand the nature and place of philosophy (falsafa) in the Arabo-Islamic cultural world; • know how to situate in history the thinkers and trends in Arabo-Islamic philosophy; 1 • know how to situate philosophy in relationship to other forms of thinking operating in this cultural world; • know how to define the main issues within the framework of Arabo-Islamic philosophy and highlight what they involve; • know how to use the tools which enable both general and more advanced study of the philosophical aspects of Arabo-Islamic thinking.
Evaluation methods	Oral exam on the subjects treated in the lectures and on the readings
Teaching methods	<p>Activities outside the class: readings; personal research to acquire and/or increase the student's familiarity with the tools and resources used in the study of Arabic philosophical texts.</p> <p>Activities in class: ex cathedra course; discussion on preparatory readings</p>
Content	The aim of this course is to introduce to the major figures, issues and texts of philosophy in pre-modern Islam. After a reminder of the historical conditions of the emergence of falsafa in Islam, the course introduces to questions regarding metaphysics, anthropology, epistemology, the philosopher in/and the city, the philosopher and the prophet.
