There is no exam, the evaluation is based on the individual and collective assignments. 50% for individual writing an oral assignments, 50% for collective writing and oral assignment.</i>
Teaching methods	<i>The course relies on a problems-based approach in the format of a world parliament simulation. Students, in groups and individually, will have to search for information about democratic challenges, provide alternative solutions and discuss them.</i>
Content	This course deals with national and international democratic challenges, with inputs from the students themselves.
