Introduction

ADPU2M - Teaching profile

Learning outcomes

Students enrolled on the Master [120] in Public Administration course are working towards becoming expert actors in public administration capable of robustly and critically analysing contemporary political phenomena and ongoing political developments, explaining them and acting within and for society, having formed an understanding of and ethics relating to public service.

The recent changes in the structures and role of the State in society have resulted in the emergence of new challenges and numerous questions concerning the management of public affairs, which public service managers are faced with on a daily basis. It is to tackle these challenges and questions that the Master in Public Administration course prepares students for employment as managers (executive and managerial positions) or as analysts, advisers or representatives with public organisations or bodies working in close collaboration with the public sector (e.g. the political parties, trade unions, professional organisations, etc.) at European, federal, regional or local level.

To this end, on successful completion of the Master in Public Administration course, as an international Master of the UCL, member of the EMPA (European Masters in Public Administration) network, the graduate will have developed **politico-institutional expertise** and be capable of implementing **analytical strategies to provide a better understanding of public affairs and its environment and of intervening in a rational, effective and fair way. Students will be able to:**

- Apply their in-depth knowledge of public life, the workings of authorities and justice and the organisation of public authorities, from local to regional, as well as at national and international level.
- Critically and pertinently use the tools (both theoretical and conceptual) and methods required to analyse complex situations/issues relating to public affairs and develop solutions that will ensure modern and effective management of the public sector.
- Adopt a viewpoint on governance at many different levels.
- Pursue a comparative approach in the analysis of institutional dynamics and the interactions between public and private stakeholders.
- Direct and evaluate, in concrete terms, changes in public organisations at European, federal, regional and local level.
- Deal with complex problems independently and rationally.
- Defend positions at different levels of the political arena.
- Identify best practices and draw lessons from foreign experience.
- On completion of this Masters course, graduates will also have developed their personal research skills, meaning that they will have independently built up their knowledge of conceptual or theoretical questioning in a field of their choice, particularly with regard to the thesis (and depending on their chosen focus and course), while interacting with the reality on the ground through the work placement coupled with the thesis.

Through their choice of focus, graduates undertake specialised training geared towards management and the evaluation of public policy, management and European policies or environmental concerns in public policy (sustainability and public policy).

Aware of the responsibility that goes with the role of decision-maker, graduates will have adopted a critical academic attitude, enabling them to make decisions completely independently, with **civic and ethical values and public service** being core concerns. They will have invested in a continuous development approach enabling them, as professionals, to demonstrate expertise, and the ability to adapt and evolve positively in their socio-professional environment.

On successful completion of this programme, each student is able to :

On completion of this programme, graduates, like any Master in Political Science graduate (and more specifically in the field of public administration), will be able to:

CG1. Develop political understanding and action: develop an understanding of and ethics relating to public service

- CG1.1. Identify, analyse and understand the political issues of a given situation.
- CG1.2. Adopt a stance in debates and negotiations in defence of the interests of the institutions and organisations they represent.
- CG1.3. Incorporate the ethical dimension and the "in the public service and for the common good" dimension into the political debates and actions.

CG2. Position their analyses and/or actions in a multi-level perspective.

- CG2.1. Identify the different institutional levels.
- CG2.2. Demonstrate in-depth and specialised knowledge (depending on the course choice) of the different political and institutional systems and political issues at international, European and Belgian level.
- CG2.3. Compare the different political and institutional systems, both national and international.
- CG2.4. Identify the various government and non-government stakeholders (social movements, interest groups, citizens, etc.) and demonstrate in-depth knowledge of their positions.
- CG2.5. Analyse the interactions between the different stakeholders, from the relationships between political parties and states to the role of non-governmental organisations.

CG3. Adopt a robust and interdisciplinary approach to analysing complex political, economic and social situations.

CG3.1. Demonstrate in-depth specialist knowledge (theories, fundamentals, phenomena) of political science, according to the course chosen.

CG3.2. Demonstrate in-depth knowledge of key aspects of the human and social science disciplines related to political sciences, according to the course chosen: law, history, geopolitics, sociology and economics.

CG3.3. Pertinently and robustly apply the data analysis (qualitative and quantitative) and diagnostic tools in social and political sciences to provide a better understanding of the complexity of "political life".

CG3.4. Apply and leverage these tools and knowledge to analyse the issues/questions specific to political science (according to the course chosen).

CG4. Apply their politico-institutional knowledge to advise on political action with regard to a given situation in a specific sector or area (according to the course chosen).

CG4.1. Demonstrate an understanding and knowledge (for the course chosen) of the issues specific to the different sectors of political life (environment, family, humanitarian, etc.).

CG4.2. Explain and analyse specific contexts and situations:

- Analyse the different regional geographic areas.
- Evaluate political action by sector or area.
- Use rigorous analytical and diagnostic tools.
- Apply a rigorous comparative approach.

CG4.3. Advise on "political" action in the broad sense of the term, demonstrating expertise and applying strategic advice skills (strategy of influence and lobbying, strategies and tools for political communication, negotiation/mediation and marketing).

CG4.4. Contribute to the analysis and/or design of management strategies for real-life political situations, according to the course chosen.

CG5. Disseminate pertinent political, economic and social information adapted to the targeted sector of the public and interact constructively with the different stakeholders involved in a given situation.

CG5.1. Communicate pertinently, both verbally and in writing, on complex topics/situations in political sciences:

- Select the relevant information required to analyse and compare political situations.
- Present the information in an accurate, structured, clear, precise and well-argued manner (demonstrating an ability to prepare reports, assessments, critical reviews, notes, etc.).
- Adapt the communication (content and form) to the targeted sector of the public and to the intended purposes according to the communication standards specific to the context (popularising, etc.).

CG5.2. Communicate articulately in English, verbally and in writing, in a clear, coherent and well-argued manner on general matters or issues relating to the field of political science. (Level B2 of the Common European Framework of Reference).

CG5.3. Communicate, interact and negotiate constructively with various representatives, including colleagues, political decision-makers and target audiences.

CG5.4. Liaise and collaborate effectively within a team and network effectively with other agencies involved in a given situation.

CG6. Devise and implement a personal research project (thesis), adopting a robust and critical scientific and methodological approach, in order to conduct a detailed analysis of an issue related to political science (in the chosen field of study).

CG6.1. Define and explain a research subject, making sure that it is placed in the proper context.

CG6.2. Prepare a critical report on the literature relating to this subject, making active, critical and pertinent use of information tools and primary and secondary sources.

CG6.3. Construct and implement a robust methodological and analytical approach.

CG6.4. Devise and carry out, if appropriate, a quantitative and/or qualitative empirical research project using suitable analytical tools.

CG6.5. Develop an objective analysis and the ability to summarise so as to enable the relevant parameters to be put into perspective and pertinent conclusions to be formed.

More specifically, as Master [120] in Public Administration graduates, they will be able to:

Develop expertise and a high level of skills in the field of public administration and specifically in the analysis of organisations, public policy and actions, as well as in the modern and effective management of the public sector in order to participate in public decision-making and be able to take employment with public or parapublic organisations at European, federal, regional and local level.

AP.1. Demonstrate and use, in a critical manner, in-depth and specialist knowledge related to:

- the functioning and management of public organisations;
- the analysis and control of public action;
- the multi-level dimension of institutional systems;
- the political arena at national, European and international level.

AP.2. Demonstrate and use, in a critical manner, in-depth and specialist knowledge of management and human resources with a public service ethos.

AP.3. Analyse and manage complex situations/issues relating to public affairs by:

- identifying, analysing and taking account of multiple issues facing the institutions and stakeholders within the framework of the management of public affairs;
- critically and pertinently using the tools (theoretical and conceptual) and methods required to analyse and act on the performance of the policies implemented;
- taking a comparative approach in the analysis of institutional dynamics and the interactions between public and private stakeholders;
- adopting a viewpoint on multi-level governance;
- aiming for efficiency and modernity in public management.

AP.4. Organise and direct political consultation, the monitoring of procedures and processes, as well as the introduction of control or monitoring tools.

AP.5. Work as part of a team within a hierarchy, clustering or working in a network.

AP.6. Identify, analyse and direct changes in public organisations and create and provide well thought out and pertinent innovation.

AP.7. Develop skills related to their first work experience (work placement):

- Situate and perform their role and scope of action within an organisation, liaising with the various internal and external stakeholders and adapting to the context and operational principles.
- Compare theory and practice in order to learn how to critically examine the operation of an organisation and/or a problematic situation, as well as the theory relating to reality on the ground (a "round trip" between theories and practices).

If they have pursued the professional focus, Management and Evaluation of Public Policy, they will be able to: develop expert knowledge and a high level of expertise in the evaluation of public policy based on a multidisciplinary approach (politics, economy and public law, sociology and communication) to public policy occupations, with the aim of moving into careers in the public sector.

If they have pursued the professional focus, Management and European Policies, they will be able to: develop expert knowledge and a high level of expertise relating to European issues in economic, political and legal areas, with the aim of moving into careers in the public or private sectors involved in European policies.

If they have pursued the professional focus, Public Policies and Sustainability, they will be able to: develop expert generalist knowledge in management of the environment and natural resources, using a multidisciplinary approach and having developed skills specific to the political aspect of these subjects; they will also be capable of incorporating environmental issues into public policies and society in general.

Programme structure

Students are required to follow all the core subjects totaling 70 credits and must choose one of two focuses (research or professional), each of which is worth 30 credits. To complete the programme and reach the necessary total of 120 credits, there is a choice of options based on regional axes (for example Belgium, Europe and Asia) or language courses.

The first year of the Master concentrates on in-depth study of the management of public organizations and public policy (30 credits); it also includes three advanced courses related to the other areas of political science (comparative politics, international relations, European studies for 15 credits) and optional subjects (15 credits).

During the second year, students pursue their focus (30 credits), produce a dissertation (25 credits) and choose a further 5 credits.

The research focus is designed to improve research skills in public administration. The teaching, which is shared with the 120 credit Master in political science, is designed to improve students' methodology, help them learn how to work in a research team and to show them how to start preparing for their doctorate.

The research focus in policy and administration prepares the student for a professional career. Through a series of cross-disciplinary courses which bring together comparative politics, the analysis of public policy and related disciplines (law, communication, sociology, ethics), students develop practical skills in the field of public policy, in the widest possible sense. This focus also includes

a period of compulsory work placement supervised by a lecturer from the Department. The work placement is associated with the student's dissertation.

The Erasmus and, to a lesser extent, the Mercator schemes provide finance for study visits abroad for a semester.

In the context of the "Louvain Academy", UCL and FUCAM (Facultés Universitaires Catholiques de Mons à Mons – Catholic University Faculties of Mons in Mons) offer jointly Masters' programmes (120 credits) in Political Science, either as a general subject or with the emphasis on international relations or public administration. Students may choose to study the focus at a partner institution and gain a degree issued jointly by the two institutions. These exchanges are made possible by specially coordinated courses and timetables.

Whatever the focus or the options chosen, the programme of this master shall totalize 120 credits, spread over two years of studies each of 60 credits.

Teaching method

In order to assist the students to develop politico-institutional expertise and target strategies to address the global environment, teaching incorporates:

- A multidisciplinary approach. Most of the lecturers have received training in two or three disciplines, contributing to the prioritisation of an interdisciplinary approach.
- Varied teaching methods. The classes offered generally combine a number of teaching methods, such as dynamic multimedia presentations, eLearning exercises, case studies, problem-based training, work placements and group work. These different methods are aimed at providing high-quality learning by creating links between theory and practice.
- Integration of new technologies. To energise the teaching and monitor each student individually, several courses use an online learning platform enabling each student to learn at his/her own pace and to benefit from individual feedback.

Evaluation

The evaluation methods comply with the [regulations concerning studies and exams](#). More detailed explanation of the modalities specific to each learning unit are available on their description sheets under the heading "Learning outcomes evaluation method".

The evaluation methods vary according to the programme. In general terms, the lecturers provide assessments using one or more of these tools: individual or group work, written and oral examinations, presentation and defence of the thesis.

Mobility and/or Internationalisation outlook

- for the **Chair of Political, Administrative and International Reform lectures**, the Department of Political and Social Science invites two or three internationally renowned researchers in political science to address students at UCL. The lectures are either in French or English.

- the subjects available as area studies also encourage students to adopt a more international outlook
- study visits abroad lasting a semester are possible via exchange programmes such as Erasmus.

Possible trainings at the end of the programme

Doctoral programmes : Doctoral school in political science or any other doctoral school certified by the Graduate College in political and social science

Certificates
