Introduction

ROGE2M1 - Teaching profile

Learning outcomes

At the end of his studies, the student will have developed communication skills in the two languages studied (one Germanic language and one Romance language) which will have been part of his 60 credit master programme. These skills are classed at European level as belonging to a 'proficient user'.

Moreover, the student will have been given an introduction to a linguistic or literary approach in the linguistic fields selected.

On successful completion of this programme, each student is able to :

1. **Situer, analyser et interpréter de manière rigoureuse les productions langagières (de genres, registres et styles variés) de deux langues étrangères (l'une choisie parmi l'anglais, le néerlandais et l'allemand, et l'autre parmi l'espagnol, l'italien et le français) d'un point de vue textuel, historique, stylistique, rhétorique et thématique.**
2. **Reconnaître, à l'intérieur de deux littératures des langues modernes (précitées en 1) des liens de circulation, de parenté, mais aussi des dissemblances et des spécificités entre différents auteurs, Œuvres et tendances de l'histoire générale de la littérature.**
3. **Décrire et interroger les savoirs véhiculés par la littérature envisagée comme outil d'exploration anthropologique et mode d'accès privilégié à la culture autre.**
4. **Produire une lecture critique (décrire, analyser et interpréter) d'un texte en mobilisant des outils méthodologiques et conceptuels spécifiques (issus, par exemple, du comparatisme, des études culturelles, de la sémiotique, etc.).**
5. **Expliquer la nature de certaines théories linguistiques, en décrire les différentes composantes et les mobiliser de manière appropriée dans une analyse linguistique, pour les deux langues modernes (précitées en 1).**
6. **Définir et identifier les différents types de variétés langagières lors de l'analyse de productions orales et écrites, dans les deux langues modernes (précitées en 1).**
7. **Utiliser de manière pertinente certains logiciels de base de l'analyse linguistique**
8. **Collecter, annoter et analyser des données linguistiques de manière appropriée en sélectionnant le(s) type(s) de données et la méthode d'analyse linguistique (théorique et pratique) les plus adéquats en fonction des questions scientifiques abordées.**
9. **Maîtriser à un niveau d'expertise (niveau C1 du Cadre européen de référence) les deux langues modernes (précitées en 1) à l'oral comme à l'écrit, sur les plans normatif et argumentatif, avec une excellence communicative en termes de formulation de la pensée, de capacité de lecture, de compréhension de différents types de textes et de rédaction.**
 - Participer avec aisance à des communications interactives relevant de la vie sociale, professionnelle et académique ;
 - S'exprimer par écrit sur des sujets complexes de façon claire et bien structurée, maîtriser le vocabulaire académique et les outils d'organisation et de cohésion du discours ;
 - Comprendre sans difficulté des présentations complexes en langues étrangères, même si elles sont exprimées dans une langue un peu déviante par rapport à la langue standard ;
 - Comprendre une grande gamme de textes longs et exigeants, ainsi que saisir dans le détail des significations implicites.
10. **Communiquer en français et dans les deux langues modernes (précitées en 1), sur des sujets complexes (généraux, culturels, linguistiques et littéraires) :**
 - à l'oral et à l'écrit, lors de communications interactives,
 - de façon claire, cohérente, structurée, précise, argumentée et en rendant distinctes de fines nuances de sens,
 - selon les standards de communication spécifiques au contexte,
 - en adaptant sa présentation (fond et forme) au public visé (spécialistes et non-spécialistes) et aux intentions poursuivies,
11. **Développer et exprimer un savoir réflexif et critique (évalué notamment dans le cadre de la rédaction du travail de fin d'étude) à partir de l'étude de la littérature, du langage ou de la culture des langues étudiées en vue de se positionner comme un acteur de la société contemporaine, en tant qu'intellectuel humaniste, ouvert au dialogue entre le langage, la littérature et les autres savoirs, artistiques et scientifiques.**

core courses (45 credits), made up of :

- 30 language course credits (15 credits per language studied);

- 15 credits for the end of study work;

and optional courses (15 credits) to be spread equally between linguistics and literature and the languages studied.

ROGE2M1 - Information

Admission

General and specific admission requirements for this program must be satisfied at the time of enrolling at the university..

1° Student must hold a first level university degree.

2° Student must have **developed, in the Germanic and Romance languages** he wishes to include in his programme :

– **passive communicative skills** (oral and written) and **active communicative skills** (oral and written) at level « **B2+** » ('vantage') in the Common European Framework of Reference;

– **linguistic skills** (the study of grammar and its structures);

– **literary skills** (history of literature, the analysis and interpretation of literary texts);

– **broad cultural skills** (the study of the "civilisation" of the countries where the two languages studies are spoken: historical data and contemporary reality).

If the student does not demonstrate the passive and active communicative skills, he must pass a level test organised by the programme committee.

In the absence of courses in one of the three other skills (linguistic, literary or cultural) in his previous studies, prerequisites will be added to the student's masters programme (without exceeding a total of 15 credits).

In the absence of courses in the linguistic and/or literary and cultural skills, access to the master is subject to the student passing the [Preparatory Year for Master in Modern Languages and Literatures: General](#), the programme of which is established based on the student's file.

Course equivalences are submitted for approval to the chairman of the jury, the secretary of the jury and the academic faculty secretary.

The 30 credits of the English Studies minor, the Dutch Studies minor, the German Studies minor, the French Studies minor, the Hispanic Studies minor or the Italian Studies minor satisfy these requirements.

GENERAL OBSERVATION ON THE CHOICE OF LANGUAGES STUDIED

The Master in Modern Languages and Literatures : General, involves the pursuit of studies in the Germanic and Romance languages included in the bachelor programme, whether they were studied as a major or minor.

Examples :

- A Bachelor in Modern Languages and Literatures : General (Germanic language + Romance language) who has taken a minor in a second Germanic language ([Minor in Dutch Studies](#) [30.0], [Minor in English Studies](#) [30.0] or the [Minor in German Studies](#) [30.0]) includes in his masters programme one of the two Germanic languages and the Romance language studied during the first level.

- A Bachelor in Modern Languages and Literatures: German, Dutch and English (Dutch-English), who has taken the [Minor in Italian Studies](#) [30.0], includes in his masters programme one of the Germanic languages studied during the first level and the Romance language studied during the minor.

- A Bachelor in French and Romance Languages and Literatures : General who has taken a minor in a Germanic language includes in his masters programme one of the Romance languages studied during the first level (Italian, Spanish or French) and the Germanic language studied during the minor.

Teaching method

The different pathways give the student the possibility to direct his training towards his skills and interests and thus acquire relative autonomy in his training. The programme's different areas of study offer a set of coherent, high-quality classes.

- Modalities which promote interdisciplinary: in the master 60, it is the student's choice (geared towards literature, linguistics and skills classes) which holds sway.
- Variety of teaching strategies (including e-learning) : use of multimedia for the study of Germanic and Romance languages.
- Diversity of learning situations: individual and group work, seminars and lectures ; tutorial for end of study work (TFE).

Evaluation

The evaluation methods comply with the [regulations concerning studies and exams](#). More detailed explanation of the modalities specific to each learning unit are available on their description sheets under the heading "Learning outcomes evaluation method".

There are many types of evaluation: evaluation of work and seminars and/or oral and written exams.

The student must write his masters Individual final project in one of the two languages in his programme and add a summary in French.

Courses are evaluated according to current university regulations (see General Examination Regulations). Students may find further information on specific evaluation methods in the course descriptions.

Mobility and/or Internationalisation outlook

There is no possibility of a stay abroad for this 60 credit Master's degree.

Certain Spanish or Italian courses may be taken at KULeuven in the context of choosing optional courses.
